We arranged to meet and he introduced me to a spanish mate as if I were his cousin.

I remember, it was a special occasion about a film relating the maternity home where he was born. At

that time there were mainly spanish women and jewish ones that swiss midwives would take out of the

camp for them to deliver in good conditions.

I do not know how many families were split during that war and are still trying to trace their members

after so many decades. Wherever you come from, you should know that the second world war had

been an awful one. Nevertheless, in the first place, some people proved to be so kind and so human by

keeping jews in a hiding place in order to save them. Long after the war was over, the saviours

continued sending them products from their farms as presents.

What would we do nowadays in such circumstances? Would we be able to do the same?

Should we not have to honour those heros who were in everyday life just plain normal people? Do we

not have to speak of the innocent victims?

I think, through this exhibition, you entered the past maybe to understand better what human rights

mean? Probably you came to visit this camp because you are just interested in humankind?
